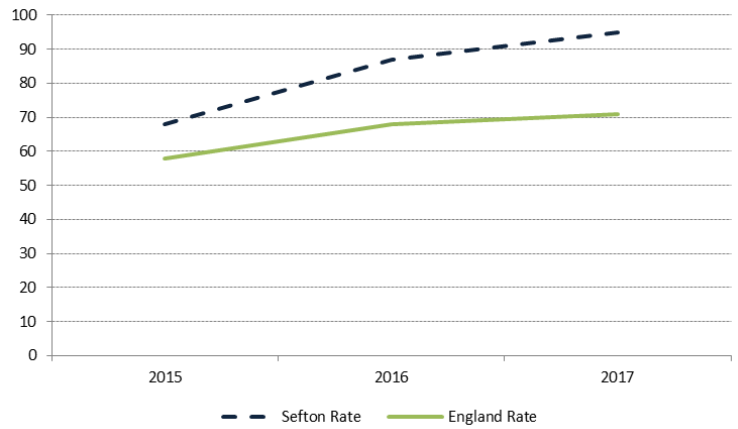

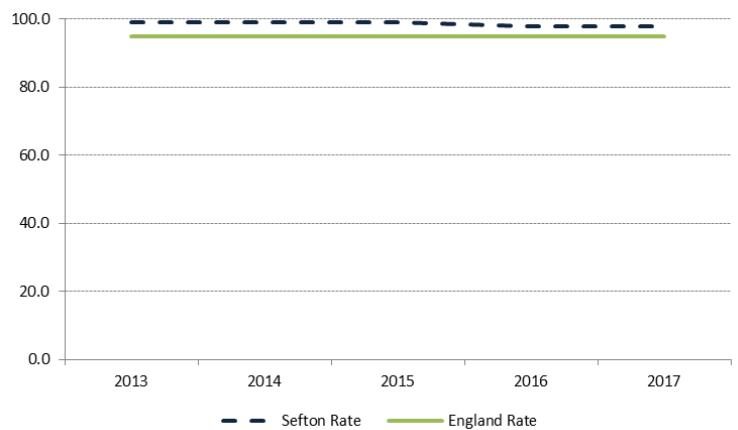

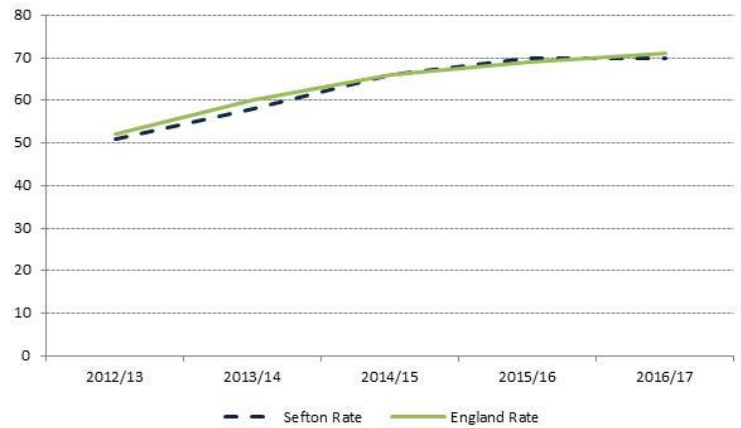
Families with two year old children may be entitled to free early education and childcare, if they meet certain criteria. Within Sefton the rate of take up has increased year on year and is continually higher than the rates seen in England.

All children aged three to four are eligible for 15 hours free education per week, with some meeting a set criteria being eligible for up to 30 hours a week. Again the Sefton take up is higher than that seen across England, yet there has been a slight reduction in take up seen in the last two years (2016 and 2017) compared to previous years.

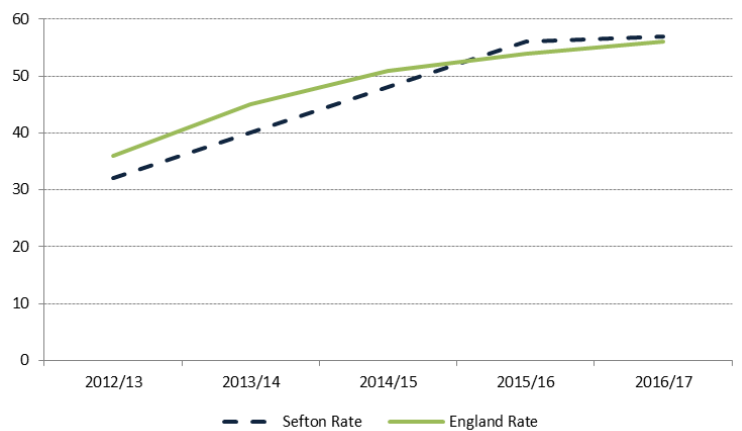

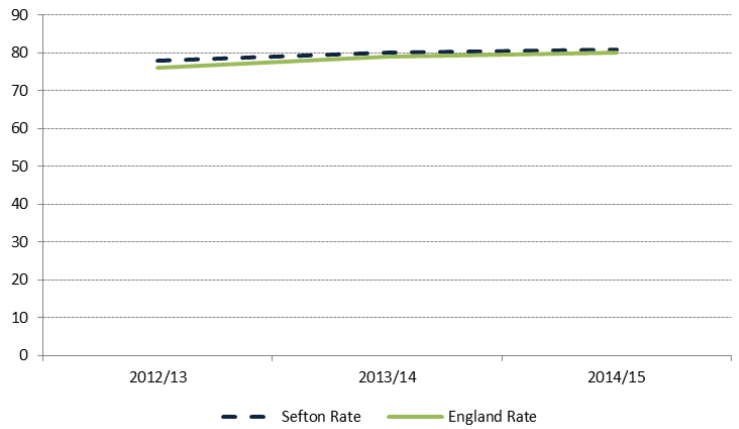
Sefton has generally seen a continual improvement in pupils attaining a good level of development in EYFS, and has remained similar to the attainment rates seen across England as a whole.

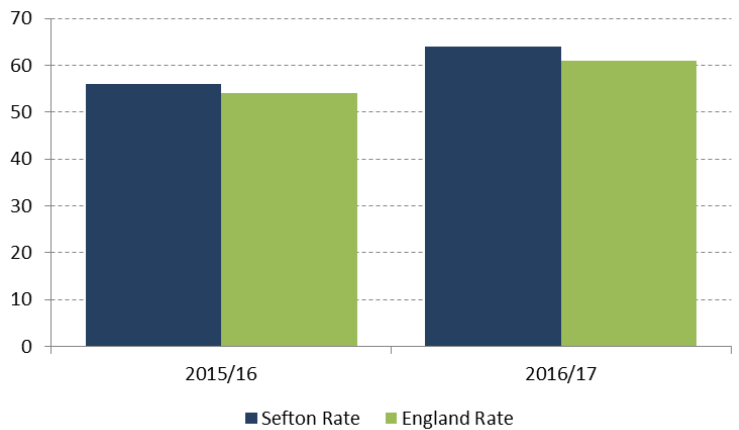

### % of Pupils Attaining Expected Standard in Reading, Writing & Maths

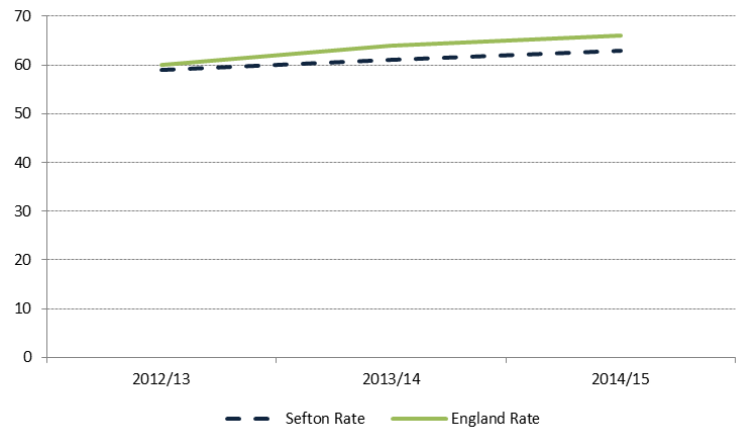

### % of Pupils Known to be Eligible for Free School Meals Attaining Level 4 or Above in Reading, Writing & Maths

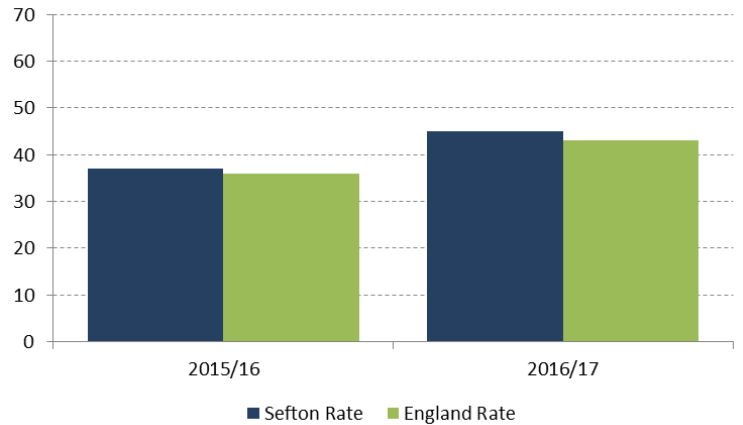

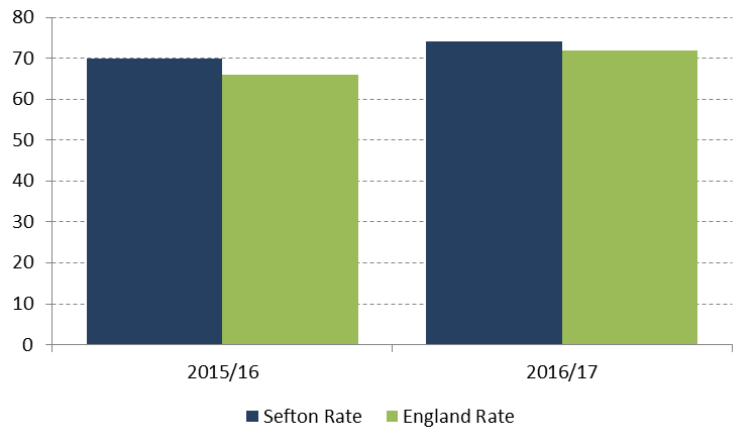
Attainment Levels changed in 2015/16

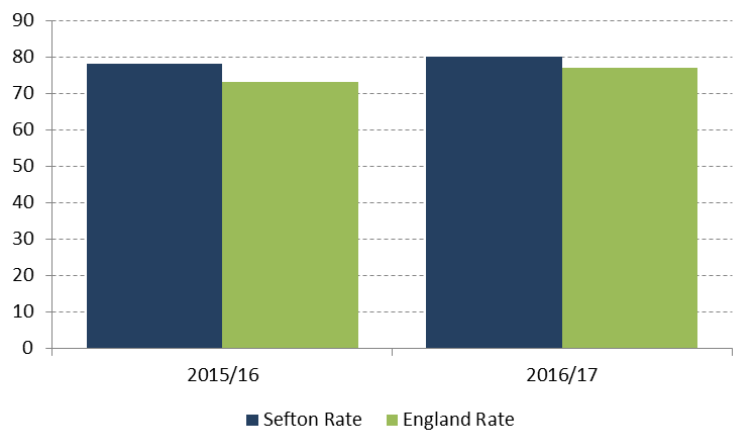
Attainment Levels changed in 2015/16

Attainment Levels changed in 2015/16

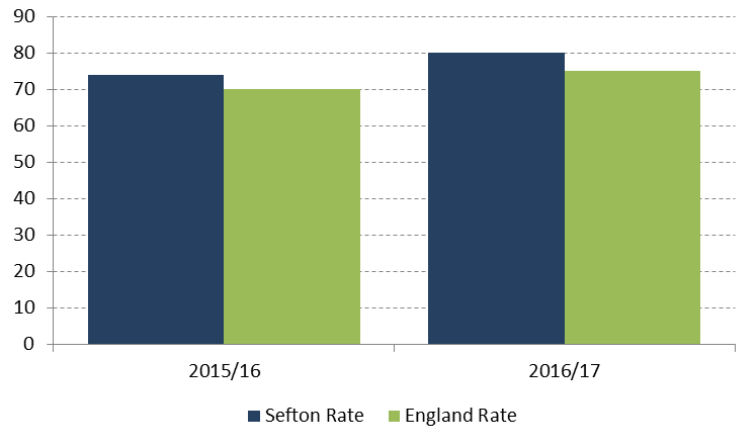

Key Stage 2 (KS2) spans from the age of 7 to 10/11 and ends with a series of national tests, which assess attainment in areas such as reading, writing, and maths. There was a change in the way attainment levels were assessed as of 2015/16.

Sefton has generally seen a continual improvement in pupil attainment levels at KS2 (across the two level types), and has continually been slightly higher than the attainment levels seen across England as a whole.

Similar to overall attainment, the rate of students eligible for free school meals have shown an increase in attainment over the time period (for both level types), yet Sefton has only been higher than England in the last two years.

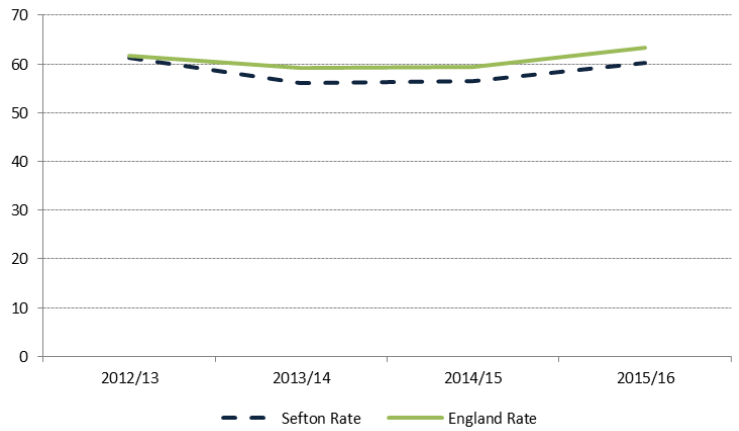
Sefton individual attainment rates for reading, grammar, punctuation and spelling along with mathematics have shown improvement when comparing the 2016/17 results to those of 2015/16. Sefton’s attainment levels for the three subjects have been continually above those of England (state funded schools).

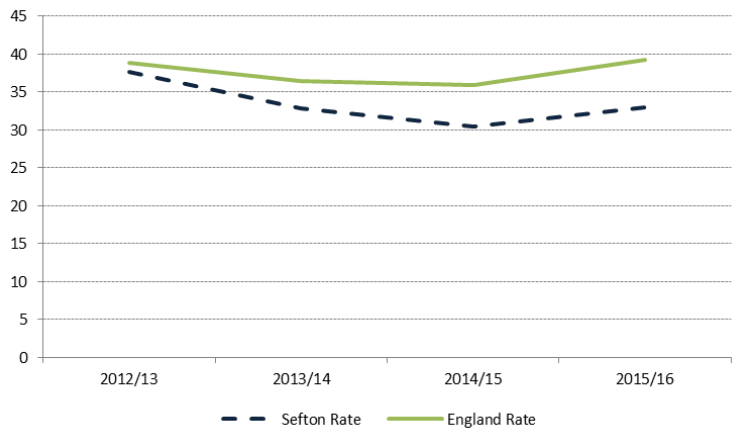

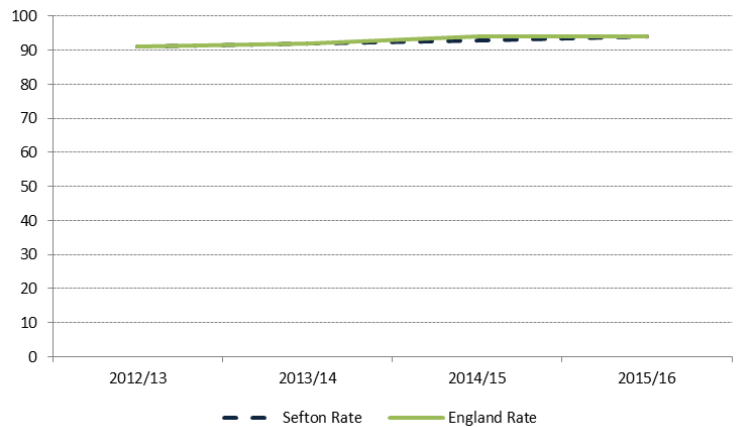

Key Stage 4 (KS4) spans from the age of 14 to 15/16 and ends with the majority of children taking GCSEs or other national tests / qualifications. There was a change in the way attainment levels were assessed as of 2016/17 moving from a lettered grading system to a numbered system (primarily in English and maths with other subjects to follow).

Pupil attainment at KS4 across Sefton has been slightly lower than England for the past five years, with results showing minimal change.

Similarly KS4 attainment levels for children receiving free school meals in Sefton have been lower than the England rates, yet levels have fluctuated across the time period. 2015/16 has seen the highest achievement levels across the time frame.

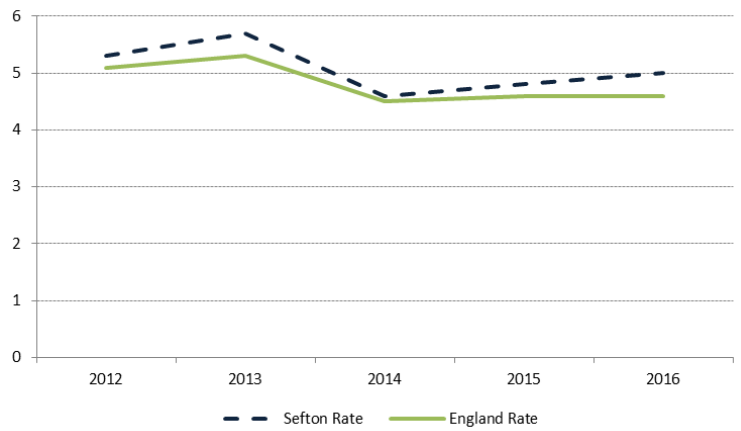
Sefton’s Attainment 8 score has fluctuated over the previous three year period yet has remained similar to that of England, whereas the Progress 8 score is below average when compared to the England rates for the past two years.

The rate of pupils who had an overall sustained education or employment / training destination in Sefton has seen a slight increase across the past four years, and are similar to the rates seen nationally

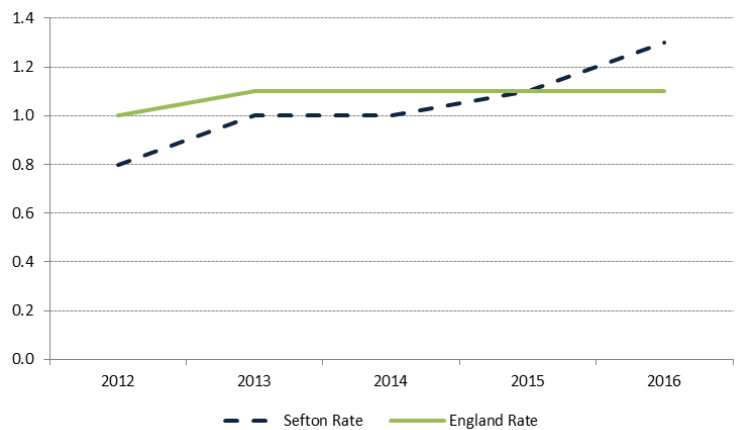

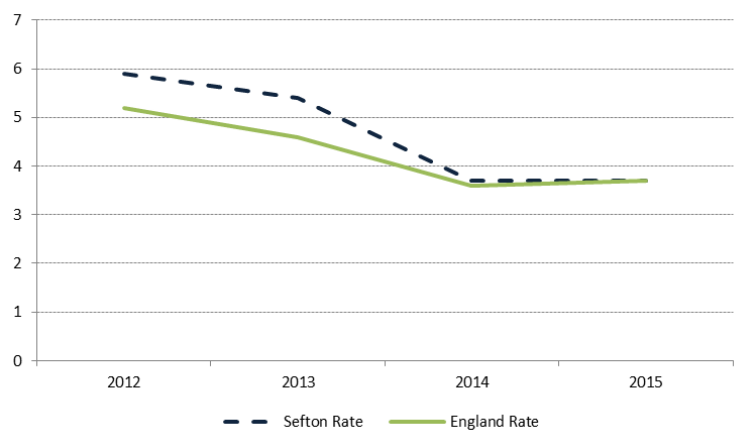

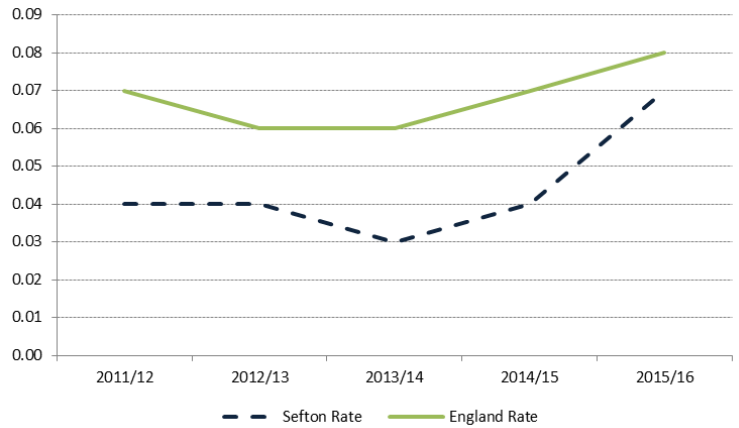

Persistent Absence Levels changed in 2016 from 15% to 10%



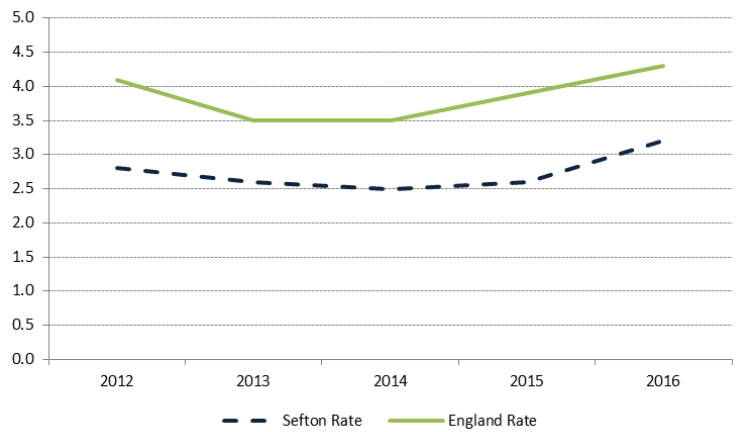

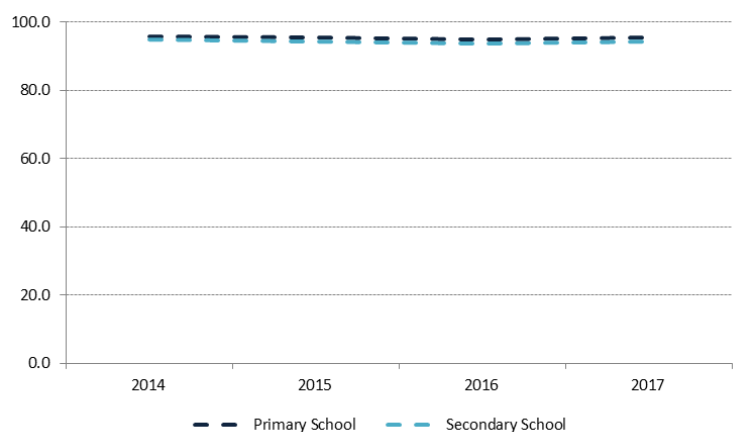
*% of Fixed Term Exclusions from State-Funded Schools*

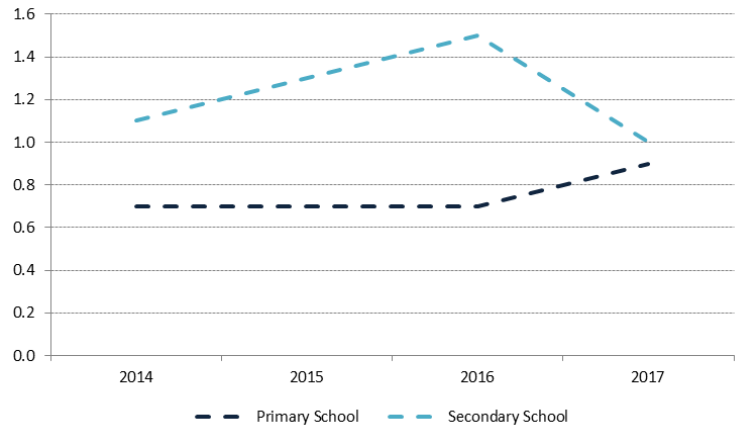

Sefton continually has a higher rate of all absences than that of England. Though unauthorised did not move above national levels until 2016, following a continual period of increase.

Persistent absence levels changed in 2016, previously 15% was counted as persistent this is now 10%. Sefton had higher rates of persistent absences than compared to England for four of the last five years.

Sefton’s permanent exclusion rate is continually lower than that seen nationally; however, there has been a steep increase when comparing 2013/14 to 2015/16 (a similar pattern can be seen in the England rates).

Sefton is below England for the rate of fixed term exclusions from state funded schools, with a sizable increase seen between 2015 and 2016.

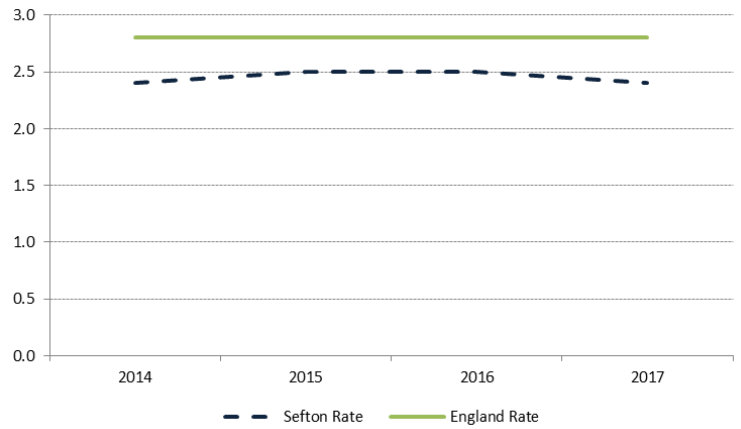
Unauthorised absences in primary schools has seen a small increase in 2017 compared previous years, with secondary schools showing slight fluctuations, however, 2017 has the lowest rate of the four current years.

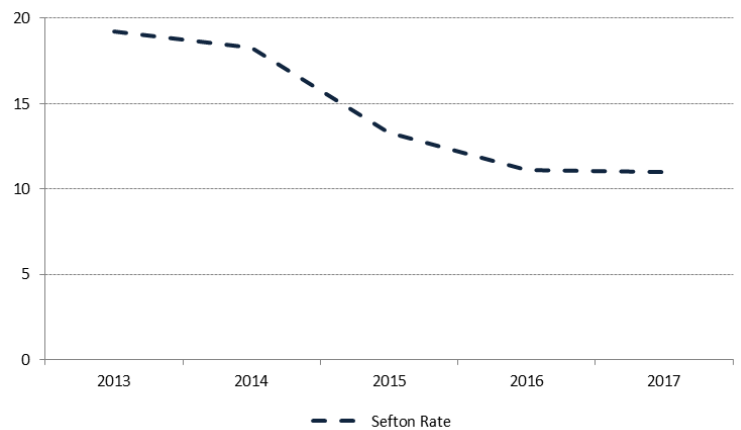

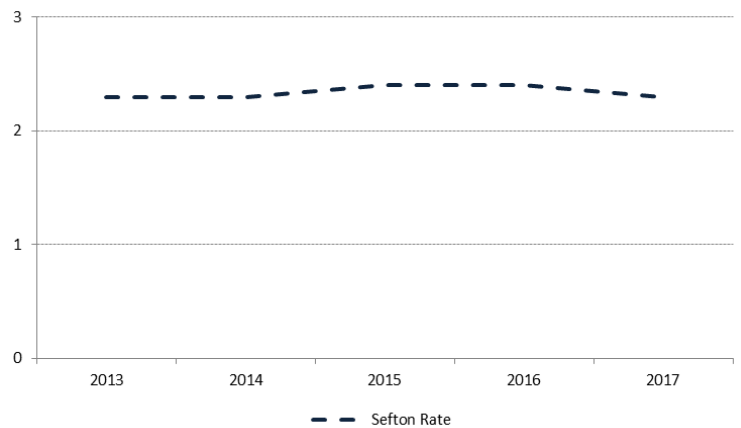

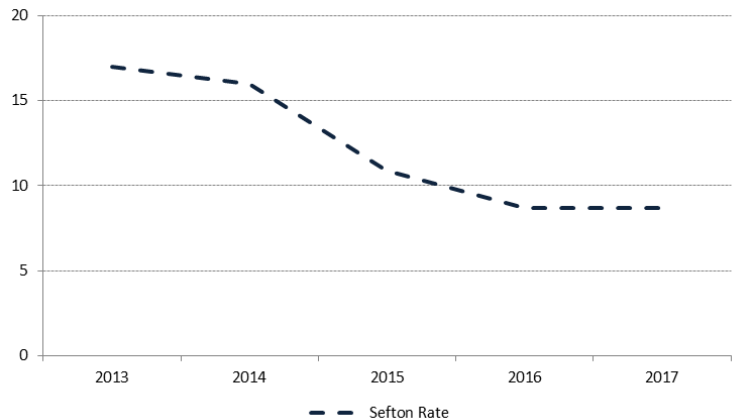

Sefton has a lower rate of children on SEN / EHC plans than nationally, with the rates showing minimal changes across the past four years.

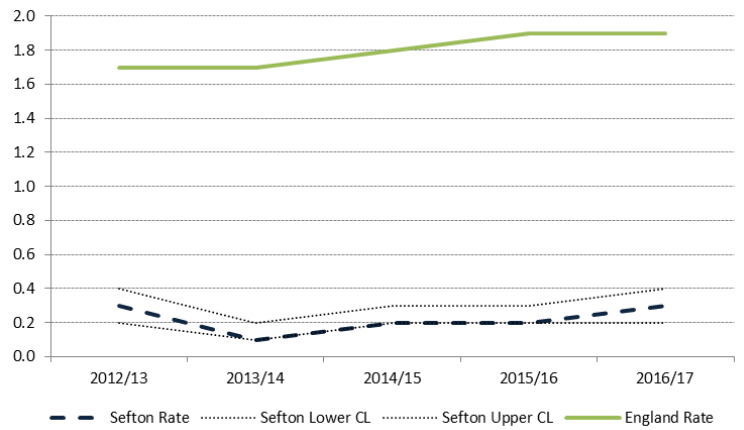
The actual number (and therefore the rate) of children within Sefton classed as SEN or on a formal EHC plan or receiving SEN support has reduced across the past five years, though this is primarily a result of changing recording / categorisation practice. These only include children residing within Sefton and attending a Sefton based school. For those children classed as SEN or that have a formal EHC plan, the numbers / rates have remained stable across the past five years. However, for those receiving support, numbers / rates have shown considerable reductions, this is due to the changing recording / categorisation practice.

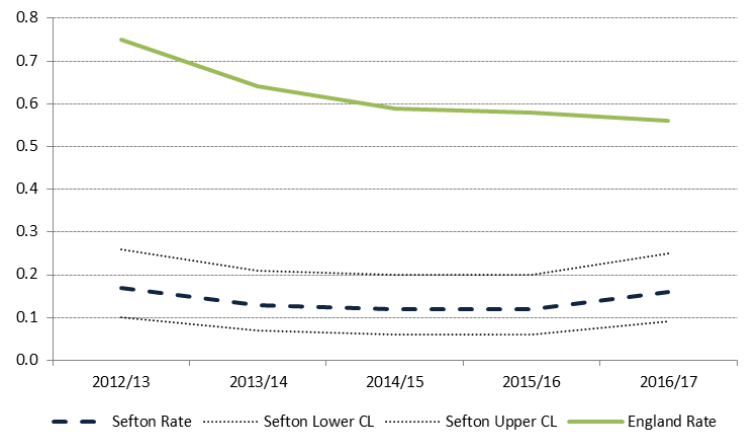

Family homelessness in Sefton is considerably lower than the national rate, and has overall seen a slight reduction, there was a larger drop seen in 2013/14. However, a slight increase can be seen over the past year.

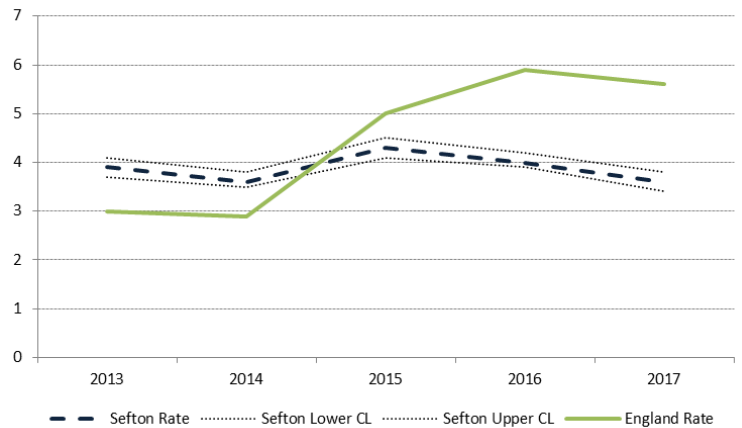

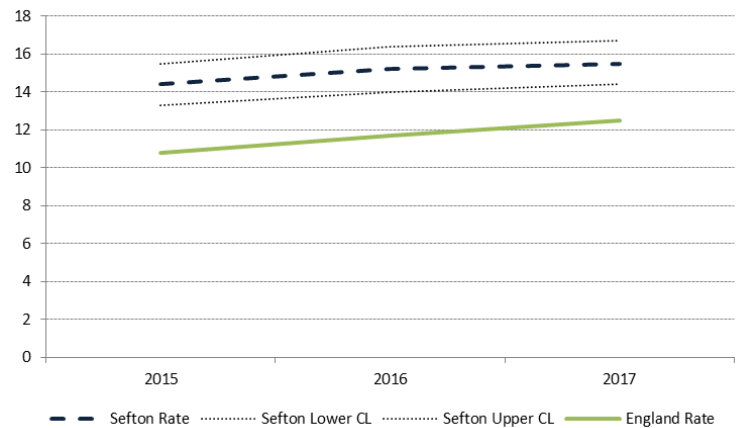

Children with learning disabilities have been classed as those children attending a primary, secondary or special school who have either a SEN statement or are School Action Plus with their primary need registered as learning disability. There are varying levels of the disability: specific, moderate, severe, profound or multiple learning disabilities

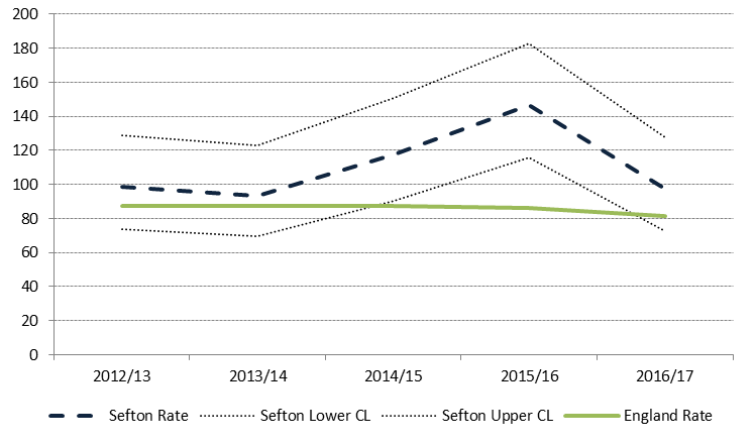
Sefton rates have seen slight fluctuations across the past four years, unlike England which has seen a considerable rise in rates in 2015 and 2016, when it moved above the Borough rate, though this is likely to reflect a change in recording practice than demographic changes over the period.

The rate of children with autism known to schools within Sefton has increased over last three years, a pattern which is mirrored both nationally and regionally. Sefton continually has rates higher than those of England and the North West.

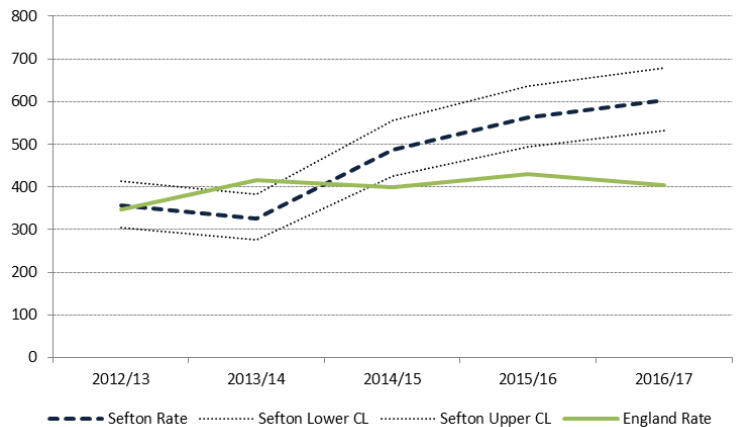

It is estimated that 1 in 10 children are affected by mental health problems such as depression, anxiety and conduct disorder. Mental health problems can impact widely on a child's future, influencing their success in school, work, relationships and community life.

After previous decreases, Sefton's rate of hospital admission for mental health conditions in under 18s has increased to 97.5 per 100,000, a considerable reduction from the previous years. However, it is still higher than the England average.

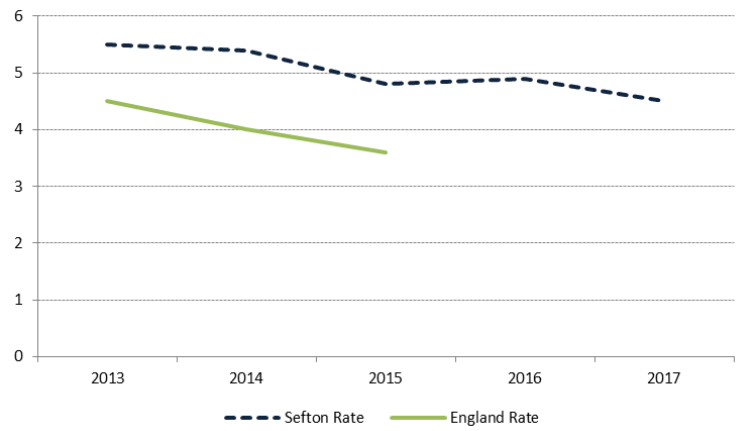
Sefton's rate of hospital admission for self-harm amongst 10-24 year olds has also increased in recent years, and is now higher than the national rate. Nationally self-harm admissions have been found to be higher for young women than young men.

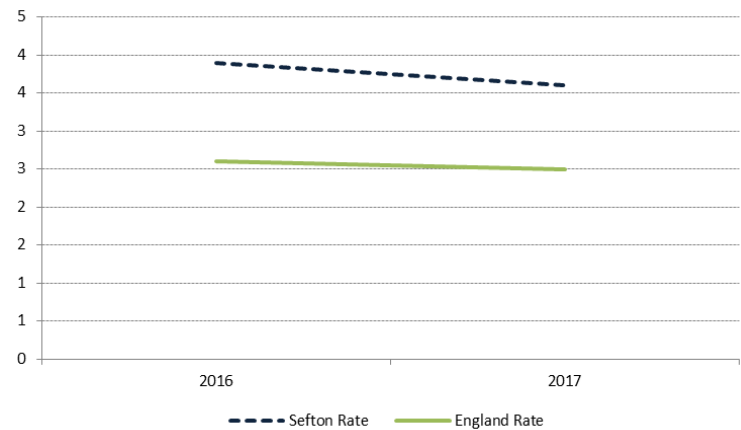

Not in Education Employment or Training (NEET) are “people aged between 16 to 24 who are either unemployed or economically inactive” <sup>ONS</sup>

The rate of NEET young people aged 16 to 18 within Sefton is continually higher than the rate seen across England; however these have shown a year on year reduction.

In 2016, the National Client Caseload Information System (NCCIS) have introduced a new measure, targeting 16 to 17 year old NEET. Levels of 16 to 17 year olds deemed as NEET in Sefton are higher than the England rate in the past two years, yet has shown reductions.

“A young carer is someone aged 18 or under who helps look after a relative who has a condition, such as a disability, illness, mental health condition, or a drug or alcohol problem. Most young carers look after one of their parents or care for a brother or sister”

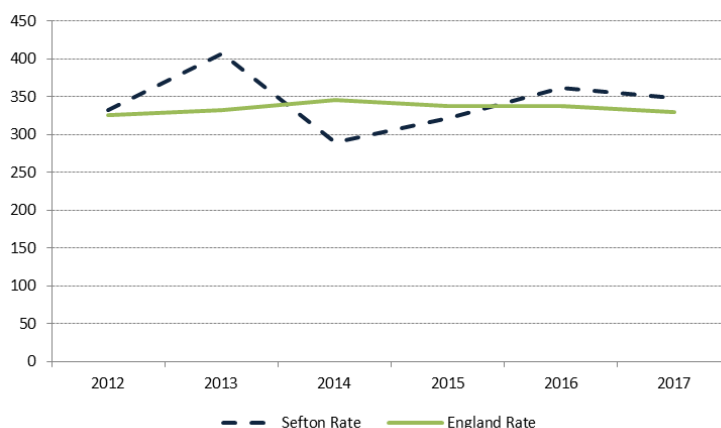

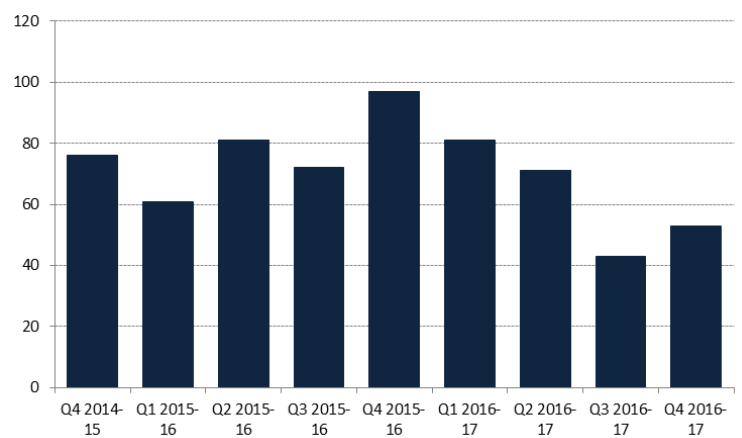

Within Children's Social Care, there are three plan types: Children in Need (CIN), Children Looked After (CLA), and Child Protection (CP).

Sefton's levels of Children in Need have fluctuated across the past six years, with Sefton having higher rates than seen nationally for four of the six years shown (2012 / 2013 / 2016 / 2017).

The rate of children looked after in Sefton has shown an overall increase from 2012 to 2017, and has continually been above the rate seen across England during this period.

Child Protection has also shown fluctuations across the time period in Sefton, with the Borough rates being higher in all but one of the depicted years when compared to England.

Referrals to Sefton social care have shown an overall increase in rates from 2012 to 2017, however, Sefton rates have been lower than England as a whole for the past three comparable years (2015, 2016 and 2017).

The proportion of children looked after who had a missing incident during the year have seen considerable increases across the past three years for both Sefton and England; however, this may be due to the indicator being relatively new and improvements being made to the reporting / recording of these episodes.

Numbers of child sexual exploitation referrals seen in Sefton since 2014/15 have varied across the quarters, with the last two quarters of 2016/17 showing the lowest numbers.

The national Troubled Families programme is a “targeted intervention for families with multiple problems, including crime, anti-social behaviour, truancy, unemployment, mental health problems and domestic abuse.”

Sefton Turnaround is the name used for the Troubled Families programme in Sefton.

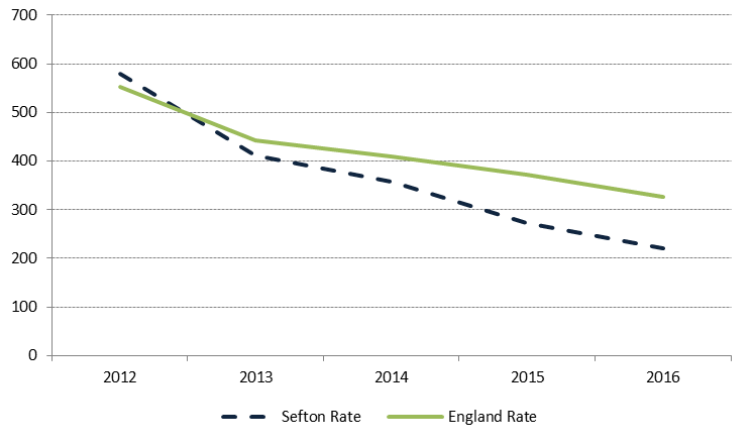
During the first phase of the programme 650 families were worked to turn around their circumstances, of which 649 were successful and therefore Sefton were allowed to claim for them (one family moved out of the area before a claim could be made).

Sefton are currently working with 2,786 families during phase two, with 232 of these already turned around. Sefton have a target to turn around a total of 2,130 families by March 2020.

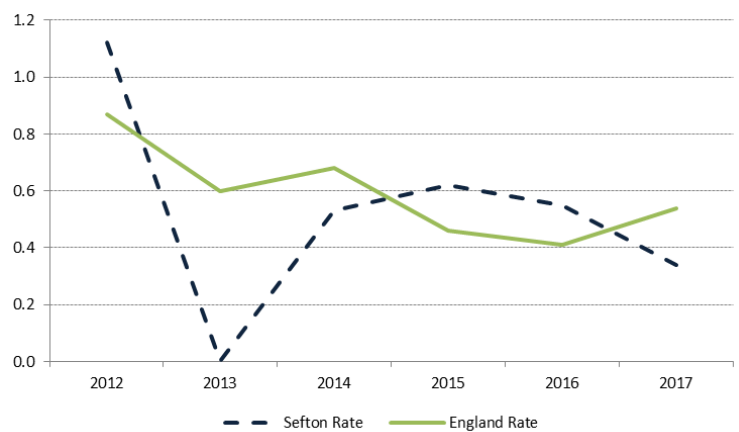

Over the past five years, the rate of first time entrants to the youth justice system (aged 10 to 17), in Sefton has shown a year on year reduction, as of 2013 Sefton has been below the rate seen nationally.

The rates of Sefton young people who have received a custodial sentence have fluctuated, with three of the past six years showing higher rates than that of England.
